#### GENERAL CERTIFICATES

### **Registration requirements**

- **5.** (1) The following are non-exemptible registration requirements for a general certificate of registration:
  - The applicant must have a professional master's degree in audiology or speech-language pathology or both from,
    - a Canadian university program accredited by the Council for Accreditation of Canadian University Programs in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology or by another accrediting body approved by the Council for that purpose, or
    - ii. a university program, other than one referred to in subparagraph i, that is determined by a panel of the Registration Committee, in accordance with subsection (2), to be equivalent to a program referred to in that subparagraph.
  - The applicant must be a Canadian citizen or a permanent resident of Canada or be authorized by the *Immigration and Refugee Protection* Act (Canada) to engage in the practice of the profession.

1. The applicant must have a **professional** master's degree <u>or greater</u> in audiology or speech-language pathology or both from,

ii. a university program, other than one referred to in subparagraph i, that is determined by a panel of the Registration Committee or by a body or bodies approved by the Council, in accordance with subsection (2), to contain both coursework and practicum and to be equivalent to a program referred to in that subparagraph i. The standard for entry-to-practice in the United States for the profession of Audiology is a professional doctorate degree. Obtaining a professional doctorate degree does not require the prior completion of a professional master's degree. As the professional doctorate degree is a higher designation than a professional master's degree, the wording "or greater" has been added to avoid the exclusion of applicants with a professional doctorate degree.

The national professional regulatory group, Canadian Alliance of Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology Regulators (CAASPR), is working with each province to harmonize the registration of audiologists and speech-language pathologists across Canada in order to facilitate improved labour mobility.

A key implication of such harmonization for the College's Registration Regulation is the designation by Council of CAASPR as a body which can assess the equivalency of applicants' coursework and practicum completed at a university not accredited by the Council for Accreditation of Canadian University Programs in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology. CAASPR is developing an application assessment process which may be used by each regulated province. While it is anticipated that the third party assessor will be CAASPR, the College's Registration Committee retains

the authority to use a different assessor approved by the Council or to complete its own assessment.

The harmonized application assessment process includes an Academic Equivalency Framework (AEF) approved by the College and the regulators from other provinces across Canada. The AEF consists of both academic components and clinical practicum components, which closely align with the College's current Regulation. The academic components specify minimum hours of coursework, covering specific content, including normal and disordered hearing, communication and swallowing functions.

The clinical practicum component also specifies minimum hours of supervised practical learning experience conducted in connection with a program of study in audiology or speechlanguage pathology.

The AEF went through a rigorous review by the regulatory colleges in each province. With its adoption, Canadian labour mobility will be better achieved as the standards will be consistent for each province.

The AEF is also consistent with the requirements for accreditation by the Council for Accreditation of Canadian University Programs in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology.

The College's current Regulation contains a rigid description of the specific course and practicum requirements. It does not permit flexibility to reflect advancements in the professions over time as changing a course or practicum requirement necessitates a Regulation amendment. By using the AEF, the College is using standards consistent across Canada and the risk of an applicant registering in a province

The College uses recent practice hours as an indicator that a member is maintaining their skills and judgement. General members of CASLPO are required to provide 750 hours of patient care or related work in audiology or speech-language pathology to maintain a general certificate of registration.  The addition of 750 hours over three years in paragraph 2 reflects the College's goal of ensuring consistency on currency requirements among the various classes of registration.  For example, currently while labour mobility applicants are required to have "practised the profession to the exent that would be premitted by the general certificate of registration at any time in the three years immediately before the date of the applicant's application", general members applying from an unregulated province or territory or another country did not have the same requirement. These members were required to have 2 years of professional experience. The requirement for two years of experience did not address the risk of an applicant who had not practiced recently.
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		The initial practice period provides an initial member with at least 6 months of professional experience. After successfully completing the mentorship process, the initial member is eligible for a general certificate of registration.  The addition of paragraph 3 closes a slight gap where an applicant may have practiced for longer than the initial practice registrant term of six months but does not have enough hours to meet the 750 hour requirement.  It was concluded that 6 months of professional experience (i.e. equivalent to the length of CASLPO's initial practice period) would be used as a reasonable benchmark to determine the applicants who would benefit from a period of mentored practice vs the applicants who would have sufficient professional experience to potentially be able to successfully complete a peer assessment.

    - ii. be eligible to be issued a general certificate of registration.
  - 2. The applicant must have completed a minimum of two years of practice within the scope of the profession.

## **Registration requirements**

**12.** The following are is a non-exemptible registration requirements for a non-practising certificate of registration:

Deleted as these years of practice are not required. The College has no concerns with a member moving to non-practicing without working so the College does not need to apply a currency restriction.
