

Appendix A: Regulation 730 Burden Reduction Comparison Chart of Key Proposed Regulatory Changes

Requirement	Current	Proposal and Rationale	Benefits to Industry/Regulated Business
Designated Livestock Medicines	Section 2 in Reg 730; including low risk antimicrobials (e.g. ionophores) biologics, steroids, antiparasitics and topicals	Keep without further restrictions or additions	LMOs would continue to be allowed to sell and livestock farmers would continue to have uninterrupted access to designated livestock medicines.
Licensing	Two classes of licences: Class 1 – fixed business; annual renewal & cost of \$75 Class 2 – temporary location; as needed & cost of \$50	Replace with a one-class licence that would not have an expiry date or licence fee. Remove the temporary licence to facilitate online and temporary location sales. The licensees applied for in 2018 would be ‘grandfathered’ into the new licensing scheme	Remove current restrictions placed on location and time of sale Provide for sales at temporary locations and at any time including online sales.
Conditions of Sale	Shall keep medicines in a fridge, cabinet or storage facility that is used solely for that purpose. Keep refrigerated all livestock medicines that require refrigeration. Do not sell expired products. No repackaging.	Replace with an outcome-based requirement intended to avoid ineffective storage that could result in a harmful or ineffective livestock medicine product. Remove labelling and use directions. Keep requirement for no repackaging to protect against contamination or mislabelling.	Streamlined, simplified and non-duplicative rules would continue to protect safety and quality of livestock medicines while saving time and money for LMOs.
Sales Procedures	Only sell to livestock owners Using medicines to induce purchase of other medicines or goods not allowed. Draw attention of purchaser to warning or caution. No delivery.	Modify and reframe as ‘for treatment of livestock’ to account for valid purchase by livestock custodians or caregivers Remove (redundant; would not add any protection) Remove (regulatory barrier)	Safety and quality of livestock medicines would continue to be protected while streamlined, simplified and non-duplicative rules would save time and money for LMOs. Removing the “No Delivery” requirement enables on-line sales to occur.
Advertising	No advertising in respect of livestock medicines by a licensee shall exceed the claims or information set out on the manufacturer’s label.	Remove (duplicative; is covered by Food and Drugs Act; s 9(1))	All outdated and duplicative requirements would be removed to save time and money to LMOs.
Recordkeeping	Record date of sale, name and address of purchaser, brand name and quantity, lot number of any biologics. Keep for at least two years.	Replace with an outcome-based requirement to retain only designated livestock medicine product purchasing records for at least two years. Provide to the Ministry upon request.	Safety and quality of livestock medicines would continue to be protected while streamlined and simplified rules would save time and money for LMOs
Inspector Procedures	Procedures for when an inspector seizes, removes or detains any livestock medicine.	Remove (duplicative; is covered in the Animal Health Act, 2009, which already has inspector powers and allows for progressive compliance)	LMO inspectors are appointed under the AHA; progressive compliance tools would save time and money to LMOs.
Livestock Medicines Advisory Committee	Advisory committee appointed by the Minister.	Remove (Stakeholders have more direct engagement venues to interact with Ministry/Minister)	Ongoing access to ministry staff
